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

SUMMER CAMP @ MINFORD, OHIO, JULY 1964

Troop 68 had an unforgettable summer camp experience the summer of 1964. The Troop held a "Troop's own" summer camp on private property near Portsmouth in southern Ohio owned by the Dever family. The Dever's lived in Beavercreek and had a son (Lynn) in Troop 68. It was to be a week of wilderness camping. The troop had gone for the day to nearby Lake Jackson to swim. At the camp site there was a creek they used for swimming that also contained a good supply of leaches. While we were spending the day at Lake Jackson a storm came up at our base camp. Lightening apparently hit a tree near the cooking area. Unfortunately a chain from a trailer was wrapped around the base of the tree. The trailer contained propane tanks, food and other spare supplies. The propane exploded and spread fire to one half of the area which included several tents and the headquarters area. Several families in the area responded with offers of help. Calls were made back to Beavercreek for cars to come and pick up the Scouts. The troop returned home very late that night. Several of the adult Scouters returned to Portsmouth the next day to assess the damage and begin the clean-up and insurance processing. – Ben O'Diam.







Troop 68 gets new shelter house . . .



BOY SCOUT TROOP 68's new shelter house first was used last Monday for an Eagle Court of Honor. Nearly completed, the facility requires only some hanging of doors, outside finishing work, and work on a fireplace to be at the north end of the building.

First use of the new shelter house on the grounds of the Church of the Brethren, Dayton-Xenia Rd, was Monday evening, May 12, with an Eagle Court of Honor for the church-sponsored Boy Scout Troop 68, whose members worked on the building, a one-day project Saturday, May 10.

The shelter house, 32 x 64 ft in dimension, was designed and preassembled by Art-Homes, Inc of Fairborn. Ken Durnbaugh, member of the church and of the Art-Homes staff, directed construction, assisted by Art-Homes men Harry Baldwin, Paul Robinson, and Lloyd Moore, and a group of church members and the Scouts.

Besides being the official meeting place for Boy Scout Troop 68 and Cub Pack 68, the building will be used for a variety of church and family related activities, including day camping experiences for children and youth,

The construction of this shelter house culminates about six years of planning activity by the church congregation.

Volunteer work men included Howard Schweitzer, Roger Smith, Elvin Young, Ben O'Diam, Byron Flory, Jr, Jack Darst, Harold Durnbaugh, and John Durnbaugh, who also directed a group in preparing the foundation for the structure. Also helping on the construction May 10 and since have been Jim Fisher, Duane Bayman, Wilbur Shoup, Lowell Schleicher, Garvie Young, Oscar Derickson, Roy Biser, Warren Miller, Harold West, Lloyd Fruhwirth, Phil Johnson, and Leroy Manns. Some finish work,

including the construction of a fireplace, remains to be done. Boy Scouts assisting on construction of the building and an adjacent bridge include Casey Smith, Mark Duncan, Allan Schweitzer, Mark Haller, Paul Hooks, Chris Schleicher, John Coleman, Steve Shoup, Ted Fisher, and Bob Kaminski.

Appreciation is expressed to all who helped in planning, contributing to and constructing the facility. Its usefulness to the church and community is expected to grow as the years progress.

Dear Scout Parents



Last April we registered 41 Scouts. During the year, 30 of our membership had 10 or more days and nights of camping. This is 73%. Our troop thus qualified for the National Camping Award. Twelve of our Scouts attended Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico and ten attended summer camp at Camp Birch.

Eighteen of our Scouts camped between 10 and 20 nights, while twelve camped between 20 and 30 nights last year. Eight of our Scouts have yet to camp with their patrol or troop.

Twenty Scouts took a twelve mile cross country hike. Ten of these hiked an additional 63 miles, on one trip, to earn the 50 miler award for hiking.
